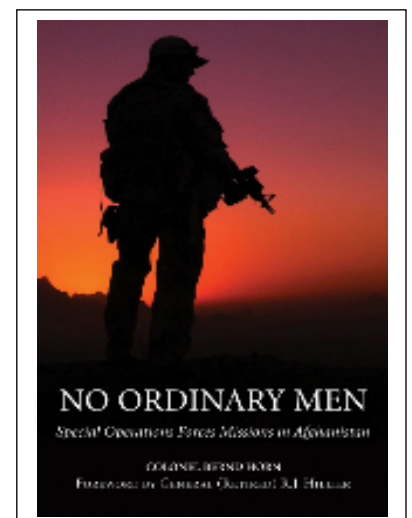


CANADIAN MILITARY READING

No Ordinary Men : Special Operations Forces Missions in Afghanistan

In 2001 the Canadian government sent elements of the elite Joint Task Force 2 counter-terrorist unit to Afghanistan to assist the United States in its global war on terror in the country as part of Operation Enduring Freedom. Withdrawn a year later, after a brief hiatus, JTF 2 returned to Afghanistan in 2005 to once again assist the Americans with the desperate struggle in the shadows to



capture or kill Taliban leaders, facilitators, and bomb makers. "No Ordinary Men" peels back the cloak of secrecy and reveals four untold special operations that JTF 2 operators conducted in 2005--06 in which their courage, tenacity, and impressive capabilities meant the difference between life and death. The book takes the reader to the Taliban sanctuaries deep in the Afghan hinterlands and provides a glimpse of Canada's remarkable legacy in special operations. Moreover, the JTF 2 missions exposed confirm that Canada's special operations forces operators are truly no ordinary men.

The aim of the symposium is to discuss Canada's policy/or lack of counter measures against targeted or accidental nuclear destruction of its environment, infra-structure, financial institutions, and people. The discussion is non-partisan and hopes to provoke further research and contribute to Canada's policy under nuclear attack or accidents.

The panel discussion hopes to examine historical nuclear threats and dependability on its allies; lessons learned from nuclear accidents in Ukraine and Japan; measures against or to minimize destruction of property and life; current nuclear powers in the world and threat implications; Canada's current policy to minimize destruction and protect property and life; and finally, offer a summary and recommendations.
