President's Comments







The Making of Billy Bishop

Brereton Greenhous

It's a war story that is told every time the career of Billy Bishop is discussed: On June 2, 1917, the young pilot single-handedly took out a German airfield in an early morning raid at the height of the Great War. For this, he was awarded the Victoria Cross, and a place in Canadian history. And yet, the attack never happened. In this explosive new biography, Brereton Greenhous exposes the myth of Billy Bishop. While his bravery never comes into question (Bishop was as courageous as any of the men who risked their lives in those early warplanes) his credibility as a storyteller does. From exaggerations and half-truths to flat-out lies, stories of Bishop's legendary exploits contain as much fiction as they do fact. Greenhous reveals many startling truths: he presents evidence that some of the medals Bishop wore late in his career were unearned, uncovers a number of examples of Bishop embellishing or inventing combat stories, and, most significantly, shows that the only account of the ace's raid on the German airfield came from Bishop himself. Even official German records of casualties fail to corroborate the Canadian's claims.

War In Ukraine

Canada announces artillery and other additional military aid for Ukraine

As the Prime Minister of Canada, Justin Trudeau, committed earlier this week, Canada has provided heavy artillery to the Security Forces of Ukraine, as Ukraine has requested. To this end, Canada has now delivered a number of M777 howitzers and associated ammunition to the Security Forces of Ukraine, in conjunction with our American Allies. While this equipment comes from the inventory of the Canadian Armed Forces, the capability will be replenished.

The M777 lightweight 155-mm towed howitzer is lighter and smaller, yet more powerful than any gun of its kind. The M777 provides indirect firepower capable of accurately hitting targets at a range of distances up to 30km.

Additionally, Canada has provided Ukraine with a significant number of additional Carl Gustaf anti-armour ammunition, as Ukraine has requested, and this capability will also be replenished.

Finally, Canada is also in the process of finalizing contracts for a number of commercial pattern armoured vehicles, which will be sent to Ukraine as soon as possible, and a service contract for the maintenance and repair of specialized drone cameras that Canada has already supplied to Ukraine.

Since January 2022, Canada has committed over \$118 million in military equipment to support Ukraine. In Budget 2022, Canada also allocated \$500 million in additional military aid for Ukraine for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

Editor's Note: those who are senior citizens will remember that Canada in the 1980s believed artillery no longer deemed useful in the modern warfare, especially the cold war with the Warsaw Pact was ending. Hence, many batteries were mothballed. Air defence units were out of strategy planning considerations. Big guns were put into storage. Then, the war in Afghanistan seemed to mark a return to artilleries and tanks. I believe DND planners overlooked that the big guns were always marked for Europe, specifically, Russia. In my early days in the army, our training always had the "Fanticans" as bad guys and our imaginary regiment always had big guns as part of our arsenal. The good old days. .


