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President's Comment

In this year of the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee, or having been the Monarch for the British Commonwealth for nearly 71 years, I am reminded her reign provided political stability in half the world. Certainly in Canada, as Head of the State, Her Majesty has the constitutional power to veto constitutional changes. This is important for Canada. Unlike USA where there is the House of Congress and the Senate to Oversee Presidential decrees, Her Majesty serves as a constitutional safeguard to ensure the Prime Minister's office plays by the rules.

Do you know that young Elizabeth served in British Territorial Army. TA, during WWII as a MSE Op (Mobile Services Equipment Operator) or A truck driver and attained the rank of Lance Corporal. She did not pull any weight and served diligently as a soldier. Here is my salute to you, Your Majesty.



In March this year, the annual EUSI Symposium featured UAV 9Unmanned Air Vehicles/drones in defensive or offensive operations. In May, a quantity of Canadian Drones were shipped to Ukraine. A British contact of mine told me that in June, a Russian Major General was taken out by a modified Canadian drone. He was talking on his cell, utilizing Ukrainian cell tower and his whereabouts were pinpointed by GPS, whereupon an armed drone was dispatched and the rest is confidential.

The topic for the 2023 Symposium was decided upon by the board in our last board meeting at Boston Pizza, The topic is to discuss the formation of a national response group to deal with natural disasters. This group will be able to research and project natural disasters, thereby minimizing property damages in a proactive way. To further discuss the formation of a national group, it would also be necessary to review the National Defence Act, Aid to Civil Power. To rely on the military to deal with disasters is inefficient and undermine the capacity of the military, especially in today's unstable world environment. We are hoping an insurance company would participate in the symposium. EUSI members who have connections with the private insurance business, please advise president, EUSI. The propose date for the symposium will be sometime in the Spring of 2023.



RUSI(NS) Distinguished Speaker -14 September 2022 Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems.

The Royal United Services Institute of Nova Scotia extends an invitation to a presentation Wednesday, 14 September by Lieutenant Colonel Julien Letarte, Royal Canadian Air Force, titled "Remotely Piloted Aircraft System..

Uncrewed aerial vehicles, including remotely piloted aircraft systems (RPAS), are rapidly being developed and employed for continental/homeland defence, security and safety missions by Canada, allies and adversaries. Lieutenant Colonel Letarte will brief highlights of the Royal Canadian Air Force's RPAS project to provide a familiarization with this increasingly significant capability. The event will start at 1pm Atlantic time, Wednesday, 14 September, then be followed by Q&A and finish by 3pm Atlantic time. A United States Air Force speaker may be added later but there will be no change to timings. Registration is required. There is no fee to attend this event. BATTLE OF BRITAIN. OFFICIALLY CELEBRATED ON 15 SEPTEMBER.

In 1940, from 10 July until 31 October, the Royal Air Force Fighter Command thwarted the German Luftwaffe's attempts to gain air supremacy over southern England, averting possible invasion and downing 1,733 German aircraft.

But the efforts were not without significant sacrifice: 915 British craft were lost and an estimated 544 of the 2,927 aircrew of the RAF were killed. Losses from other allies, including Canadian, were not included in the number.

Their numerical disadvantage prompted Prime Minister Winston Churchill to describe them as the 'few' in his speech to Parliament on 20 August 1940.



What do you call a person who can not tell the difference between a ladle and a spoon? *Overweight.*


A woman is getting lunch ready when the phone rings. "This is the middle school calling about your son Phillip. He has been caught telling unbelievable lies."
